In 1976 the Rotary International Board of Directors sought to create a

concise definition of the fundamental aspects of Rotary. This definition, prepared by Rotary's Public Relations Committee, has been used ever since in various Rotary publications:

"Rotary is an organization of business and professional leaders united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations and help build goodwill and peace in the world."

Those 31 words are worth remembering when someone asks, "What is Rotary?"
